The Idaho Department of Agriculture has already found 7 boats at their inspection stations fouled with Zebra or Quagga mussels this Spring. If you can encourage your members to make sure they have their boats inspected if they have been out of state before launching in Idaho waters it would be much appreciated. Not only will these mussels impact the local ecology of lakes and rivers, if these mussels get into Idaho's waters it may cost hundreds of millions of dollars to deal with impacts to hydro power systems, irrigation lines, and fish hatcheries.

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2012 WEED RUN

2012 Salmon River Noxious Weed Control Project - May 4, 5 and

Each spring, in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service, the Idaho Department of Agriculture, and private property owners WWA members provide transportation up the Salmon River and manpower to help control noxious weeds within the Frank Church -River of No Return Wilderness. In the past, the Western Whitewater Association has provided logistical support, technical assistance. and some financial assistance in an active assault on noxious weeds along the Salmon River corridor.

This year, we will need approximately 6 boats and 20 volunteers to help spray weeds. Since the boats are loaded pretty heavy, and we can typically expect fairly high river flows, we ask that the less experienced Salmon River pilots leave their boats home and ride up with the more experienced pilots. We will also several Government have Agency Representatives along this year to give us a hand. Come enjoy a good workout and lots of fun with friends in the beautiful Salmon River canyon.

The WWA will be pro-

viding noxious weed control at the private ranches on the river and we will be staging out of Mackay Bar this year. This project requires a significant amount of physical labor, as the weed control methods primarily entail hand application of chemical sprays and some hand pulling with much of the work taking place on steep ter-

rain. Safety equipment will be provided to those that will be handling chemicals. The club currently owns about 20 back pack sprayers that will be our primary application method. Again this year, spray materials and boat fuel

are being covered by government grants.

We will be departing Spring Bar, 13 miles up river from Riggins, on Friday May 4 beginning at 8:30am. Most people will spend the night of May 3 at the Spring Bar campground to make loading go smoothly and to keep unforeseen issues at a minimum. A light breakfast, (muffins, and pastries) with coffee will be provided the morning of the 4th at the campground starting

at 7:30 am. Due to weight limitations for the boats and the number of people, we encourage everyone to pack light. Pay special attention to the Salmon River Road construction schedule to prevent any surprises. The road has been open on Fridays, but that could change.

We will arrive at Mackay

Bar by around noon. After unloading boats, setting up camp and a quick lunch, we will spend several hours spraying one of the target areas. We will then have a relaxing dinner followed by camaraderie around the camp fire and possibly

a round of horseshoes. We will rise early on Saturday for a yummy breakfast and then off to several more hours of spraying - lunch - spray - dinner. Sunday morning we can sleep in a little - break camp and head back down river to Spring Bar.

This year we are hoping to target the Mackay Bar area, Shepp Ranch and Indian Creek.

we have had to reschedule this event to a later date because of high water or extremely wet conditions. As we get closer the scheduled time we will let all the participants know the status of the event.

Required supplies for volunteers:

- 1. For spraying you will need work gloves, long sleeved shirts, long pants, high top boots, (old ones are best because they will probably have blue dye on them by the time you are done).
- 2. You will need a tent, sleeping bag, blanket (optional) tarp for tent (also optional)

- 3. Clothing for three days (Pack for Idaho weather conditions it could be warm and sunny or cold and wet)
- 4. Drinks that you may want, (WWA will bring pop, water, coffee and cocoa) anything you may want to put in those you need to bring
- 5. Your own life jacket would be great most of us have extras on the boat, but your own would be a good idea.
- 6. Cameras are a must!
- 7. Flash light
- 8. Camp chairs
- 9. Finally, you may

bring a dessert to help with the food. (Brownies, cake, pie, etc.) Again meals will be provided by WWA.

OVER 30 RACING TEAMS, WORLD CHAMPIONS TO COMPETE IN IDAHO FOR THE 2012 TOYOTA WORLD JET BOAT MARATHON CHAMPIONSHIP

2011 Canadian World Champion driver Gord Humphrey and navigator Chris Zapesocki (pronounced ZAP-uh-sock-ee) will be among the 33 elite racing teams competing in the 2012 Toyota Weaver Seed World Jet Boat Marathon Championship on four north central Idaho rivers next month.

The race takes place over a nine day period, April 13-21 on select sections of the St. Joe River at St. Maries, April 14-15; the Snake River at Lewiston, April 16-17; the Clearwater River at Orofino, April 18 and the Salmon River at Riggins, April 19-21.

Humphrey and Zapesocki piloted their whitewater race boat, 'Unnatural Disaster' #CDN-1 to victory this summer at the August 2011 Thunder on the Snake race in Lewiston. The Fort St. John, British Columbia team also holds the 2011 Salmon River Jet Boat Race Championship title.

Fans will have the opportunity to watch several former world champions vie for the overall title including former 8x World Champion driver Spencer King and navigator Russell King of Hay River, Northwest Territories, Canada; 4x World Champion driver Mark Cromie and navigator Richard Maunder of New Zealand; and 2x World Champion driver Dale Whiteside and navigator Wayne McGeachy of Red Deer, Alberta.

Several northwest area racers will also make a run for the championship including Lewiston driver Ryan Rogers and navigator Gary Weaver (Crabtree. Oregon); driver Jake Barney (Lewiston); Edwardsen driver Jeff (Lewiston) and navigator Ryan Hudson (Lewiston); driver Greg Boice (Clarkston, Wash.) and driver Shay White (Meridian) and navigator Grady White (Meridian).

Depending on the boat engine's size, speed and hull design, racers compete in one of several race classes including the American Turbine Unlimited Class, Shore Lodge A Class, Eagle Performance Boats CX

Each racing team consists of a driver, navigator and racing crews varying in size

from four to 20 people per team. At the 2011 Canadian World Race, the number of fans watching along riverbanks ranged from 400 to upwards of 5,000 people per venue, according to informa-
